Hope many of you can attend!

State CASA conference notes from a panel of youth that grew up in foster care. They shared their personal experiences in the foster care system.

Arieon, age 18; CASA "Always there for me." Challenge "Personal happiness and just being a kid." What is important? "Friends support that isn't going to leave even if I mess up." "Everything is temporary."

Alyssa, age 18; CASA "I don't feel alone." Challenge "Focusing on everything at once." What is important? "Christmas when I was 17 no one in my family was fighting." "Family support lived with my grandma and my church family tells me I am so strong."

Gabriel, age 16; CASA "CASA workers are nice and make us feel good." Challenge "Anger." "Wished CASA came around more." "Talking to CASA about random stuff. They didn't sugar coat it."

Bailey, age 21; CASA "A voice to a youth that doesn't feel like they have one." Challenge "Feeling normal" "I never wanted anyone to know I was in foster care." "CASA if you don't feel a connection, don't give up." What is important? "College paid for needs. Education support about my rights as a foster kid."

Jamel, age 19; CASA "I didn't have a CASA but I wished I did." Challenge "Holiday's lonely, breaks, not going on trips." What is important? "at 18 I let my anger go, I come from nothing and want to turn it into something." "Stay consistent."

The youth panel encouraged the CASA audience to talk about normal stuff not always deep stuff and to be relatable. Play ball!

When ask what is one thing you would fix for youth in care?

"Fix all broken families."

"Improve the age out of care, give more support."

"Feeling completely alone."

"All foster parents should do it for the love of children not the money. Treat them like family. Everyone needs love and affection."
