



"Standing Strong for Abused Children"

ABOUT ADVOCACY NETWORK FOR CHILDREN

Advocacy Network for Children opened its doors in January 1990 as CASA of Adams County. Its mission was to serve abused and neglected children in Adams County. The agency celebrated its 35th anniversary earlier this year.

The CASA program uses trained community volunteers who then become the voice for a child in the court system. The agency has expanded its CASA program to include the counties of Brown, Cass, Hancock, Mason, Menard, Morgan, Pike, Schuyler and Scott. Hundreds of children have been represented by trained CASA volunteers to date through the agency's CASA program.

In 1999, Advocacy Network for Children opened its first Children's Advocacy Center in Adams County. Since then, the agency has opened centers in eight additional counties to serve child victims of sexual or severe physical abuse. The counties include Brown, Cass, Hancock, McDonough, Morgan, Pike, Schuyler and Scott. The agency has provided services to thousands of child victims of sexual abuse or severe physical abuse through its Children's Advocacy Centers.

Children's Advocacy Centers use a team approach in the investigation and prosecution of sexual and severe physical abuse cases involving children. Team members include Children's Advocacy Center staff, local law enforcement, State Police, DCFS, State's Attorneys, mental health, and medical personnel. Short term counseling is also available for victims and their non-offending family members.

Advocacy Network for Children also provides a prevention program to children Pre-K through 5th grade. "P.S. It's My Body" teaches children safety strategies and is designed to decrease children's risk of being abused. Children learn to recognize welcome and unwelcome touches, practice saying "No" and moving away, and to identify trusted adults they can report unwelcome touches to. Children are reminded that they have the right to say "No" and that abuse is never their fault. The program includes a teacher and parent component that provides safety tips, strategies for talking to children about personal safety, and what to do if a child discloses abuse.

The unique services provided by Advocacy Network for Children are free and staff is available 24/7.

WHY ARE CHILDREN AFRAID TO TELL ABOUT ABUSE

There are a number of reasons why a child may not disclose abuse that is happening to him/her. Some of those include:

- The abuser shames the child or says the child let it happen.
- The abuser is often manipulative and may try to confuse the child about what is right and wrong or tell them the abuse is a "game."
- The abuser may threaten to harm the child or a family member.
- Children are afraid of disappointing their parents and disrupting the family.
- Children often love the abuser and don't want to get anyone in trouble.
- Some children are too young to understand.
